

# PAOLO FRESU – DANIELE DI BONAVENTURA

Paolo Fresu: trumpet, flugelhorn, effects - Daniele di Bonaventura: bandoneon

Air instruments and lyricism with Mediterranean aromas. In short, this is the expressive theme of the duo formed by Paolo Fresu with Daniele Di Bonaventura, which has now become a classic that fascinates every audience.

After international successes alongside the extraordinary Corsican choral ensemble A Filetta and - as a duo - a splendid recording project for ECM, the artists now find themselves in the difficult dimension of a duo, since the 'interplay' alone is not enough to make such a project soar.

The well-rehearsed encounter between the Sardinian trumpeter and the Marche bandoneonist continues to reserve touching moments of absolute lyricism and participation.

Their project of great emotional effect thrives on poetry, intimism and those little things that can express the colours of the contemporary musical universe. It might seem easy, but it is not at all.

At the basis of it all there's a definite attraction expressed tout-court by ethnic music, classical but also hiddenly electronic, and the result of this successful and fascinating musical journey that touches ancestral chords is the cathartic moment that the duo is able to offer; and the poetic extraction of the magical interplay of past mother projects that has characterised their frequent meetings, have now become a unique project of rare beauty.

#### **PAOLO FRESU**

The village band and major international awards, the Sardinian countryside and records, the discovery of jazz and a thousand collaborations, the love of small things and Paris. There are very few people capable of putting together such a collection of elements and transforming it into an incredible and rapid stylistic growth.

Paolo Fresu has succeeded precisely in a country like Italy where - for too long - jazz culture was as well known as Shakespeare or the canvases of Matisse, where Louis Armstrong was little more than a freak of insane San Remo showcases and Miles Davis was discovered to be 'black' and good well after his peak creative years.

The 'magic' lies in the immense naturalness of a man who, like few others, was able to transport the deepest meaning of his supposedly magical land into the most precious and freeing of arts.

At this point in his fortunate and long career, there is no need to enumerate the recordings, awards and various experiences that have imposed him at an international level and that make his music ecumenically loved: inside the sound of his trumpet is the sap that has given lustre to the nouvelle vague of European jazz, the depth of a thought that is not only musical, the generosity that wants him in the right place at the right time but, above all, the inexhaustible passion that has always sustained him.

Paolo's present is - as usual - turbulent, worthy of the omnivorous and creative artist that everyone recognises in him.

Today (apart from a fascinating literary side that has resulted in the publication of a number of editorial works and the important delivery of Honorary Degrees from Milan's La Bicocca University and New York's noble Berklee School of Music) it is made up of his historic quintet, which is approaching the four-decade mark of mutual esteem, but also that of the 'Devil' quartet or his new trio with two realities of contemporary jazz such as Dino Rubino and Marco Bardoscia or finally the surprising 'Heroes', a tribute to David Bowie where he collaborates with the established names Petra Magoni and Christian Meyer and with some of the most prominent of the Italian new wave jazz such as Francesco Diodati, Francesco Ponticelli and Filippo Vignato. Important international collaborations are not to be forgotten, such as the successful duo partnership with Uri Caine, or the great names of Carla Bley, Steve Swallow or Ralph Towner, which bridged the way for Paolo's name to enter the entourage of the celebrated and noble ECM label, for which other notable recordings have been released.

His more current present sees him active, in a more foreign-oriented perspective, in a trio with Richard Galliano and Swedish pianist Jan Lundgren ("Mare Nostrum") and in various new adventures with important names in the contemporary jazz entourage such as, among many others, Omar Sosa, Jaques Morelenbaum, Trilok Gurtu, Lars Danielsson, Eivind Aarset or Arild Andersen. There are also interesting projects with some big names in the Italian literary and theatrical world (Mariangela Gualtieri, Ascanio Celestini, Lella Costa, Stefano Benni, Alessandro Bergonzoni, Giuseppe Battiston), the frequentation of the theatrical world itself as a first-time performer thanks to the works produced by the Teatro Stabile di Bolzano, including the successful plays 'Tempo di Chet' and 'Tango Macondo', as well as a new series of small but important collaborations with 'intelligent' music from the Italian folk fringe or electronic music. Music for the Cinema and 'special projects' such as his extraordinary theatrical 'a solo' close the circle together with the great little adventure that led him



to celebrate his 50th birthday in 2011 with 50 concerts, on 50 consecutive days, with 50 different ensembles and projects from day to day in 50 scenic masterpieces of his Sardinia. Not to be outdone, too, is the fine project dedicated instead to his important 60th birthday, thanks to Bologna, which has now become, like Paris, one of his places of reference.

Also missing from the list is the important series of projects dedicated to various aspects of the 'classical' world tout-court, which, thanks to ad hoc works, is reserving beautiful surprises with musicians capable of 'looking ahead' or, finally, the beautiful new promotional work that Paolo is carrying out with many young lions of the contemporary jazz entourage through the possibilities offered to them thanks to his new Tuk Music label, built to look to the future and now a reference point also at the international level.

### DANIELE DI BONAVENTURA

Born in Fermo (in the Marche region of Italy), Daniele di Bonaventura, composer-arranger, pianist-bandone player, has cultivated a strong interest in improvised music since the beginning of his activity, even though he has a classical musical education (diploma in Composition) that began at the age of 8 with the study of piano, cello, composition and conducting.

His collaborations range from classical to contemporary music, from jazz to tango, from ethnic music to world music, with forays into the world of theatre, cinema and dance.

He has performed at major Italian and international festivals including: Rumori Mediterranei in Roccella Jonica '87 and '88; Jazz & Image at Villa Celimontana in Rome, Ravenna Jazz 2000, Clusone Jazz 2001, Biennale Arte Venezia 2001; Sant'Anna Arresi Jazz 2004; Festival della Letteratura Mantova 2004; Cormòns 2005, Accademia Nazionale di Santa Cecilia Stagione Musica da Camera 2005-'06; England - Music Hall Festival and Royal Festival Hall in London; Holland - Music Hall in Leeuwarden; Germany - 30th Deutsches Jazz Festival in Frankfurt; Berlin Jazz Festival; Spain - Festa de la Mercè in Barcelona; Egypt - Opera House in Cairo; Norway - Olavsfestdagen in Trondheim; France; Switzerland; Portugal; Brazil; Argentina; Slovenia; Croatia; Albania; Singapore; USA and South Africa.

His latest collaborations are with Miroslav Vitous, who called him to participate in the latest CD entitled Universal Syncopation II published by the prestigious German label ECM. Also for the same ECM label, he published his latest work entitled "Mistico Mediterraneo" a work shared with the Corsica vocal group A Filetta and Paolo Fresu.

### MARCO BARDOSCIA

In the space of a few years, Marco has managed to carve out an important place for himself in the music scene of this time. A sensitive and articulate double bass player, he is able to put to good use the interpretative and compositional approach that is the result of his studies at the Conservatorio Nino Rota in Bari and his diploma in classical double bass at the Tito Schipa in Lecce, as well as important clinics such as the Berklee School of Music, from which he was awarded the prize for best new talent in 2002.
